RENOVATION UPDATE

SECOND FLOOR

Reopening of the second floor to the public was delayed until September 2 to accommodate the movers and the installation of the Adult Services desk. The entire collection is now open to the public. Some work remains on the study rooms, Board Room, and Quiet Reading Room.





FIRST FLOOR

Carpeting and tile have been completed in the lobby. The Member Services desk has been reconfigured in its new position. Observant visitors will note that these pieces, once pulled apart, had some unanticipated wear and tear.


PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITIES



STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE August 2021

Experience: We strive to ensure that individuals have exceptional interactions with the library and are connected with resources and services that increase their quality of life. We exceed expectations.

1.1: The library has comfortable, flexible spaces that encourage use and connection.

- First floor is completely open for our members including the Workshop and study rooms.
- Second floor is open, new Adult Services desk is installed and functional.
- Branch design planning meeting held on August 23rd and project went out to bid.

1.2: The library's collection is vibrant and convenient to access.

- Service desk in Member Services installed in new configuration; three self-check stations fully functional.
- Shifting continues in Youth fiction and Adult DVD locations to maximize shelving efficiency and provide for ease of use to our members.

1.3: The library is committed to quality patron interactions.

- We continued to serve our members in building and through curbside service. Members
 continue to apply for library cards or renewal of their cards online.
- Study rooms in Workshop area are available for bookings and walk in use.

Engagement: We work continuously with the community to increase our reach and expand our impact. We are a valued community partner.

2.1: The community has high awareness of library services and programs.

- First floor reopening party and ribbon cutting for North Entrance held Aug 6-7.
- More signage being installed in renovated areas, awaiting more delivered.
- Initial discussion about when to survey the community about programs.

2.2: The library interacts with its diverse community to discover and respond to current needs of all groups.

- EDI committee continues monthly activities for staff including book discussions, suggested articles, and other media.
- Received a vendor report of the number and types of diverse titles the library purchased from our main vendor, Ingram, to help in our overall collection diversity audit.
- Planned more bilingual programs for fall newsletter including Spanish and Mandarin Chinese story times, La Loteria, Day of the Dead, Teen Language Café, and monthly ESL Conversation Club.
- New Main library signage in English and Spanish

2.3: The library creates and deepens meaningful partnerships with local organizations and businesses.

- Continued monthly Rotary meetings and volunteered for Oktoberfest event.
- Continued monthly meetings with United Palatine Coalition.
- Beginning fall outreach programs to elementary schools and daycares.

3 Endurance: We strive for sustainability in our practices, human and financial resources, and facilities. We are a resilient organization.

3.1: The library is a trusted steward of resources.

Facilities continues to repurpose, sell, or recycle equipment and materials.

3.2: The library is a preferred employer that values staff development and retention.

 Managers began working on annual stay interviews to get staff feedback on satisfaction and retention.

- Finance Committee reviewed the current investment portfolio. PMA will update cash forecasting, and the committee will meet again on 10/5 with PMA to discuss the longterm investments.
- The Building Renovation Committee approved changes to the scope of work for the garage lighting project, adding in new electrical conduit to replace existing conduit that has been determined to be deteriorating.
- The garage concrete repairs are progressing on schedule. Concrete was poured after demolition on the north side of the upper level.








Executive Summary

During the entire duration of the 2021 Summer Reading Challenge the Palatine Library District's Main Branch has been undergoing a renovation. By July the first floor reopened fully (except for the Workshop Area) and the second floor was closed to members. All members had the option to sign up in person, online, over the phone, or through the app. Many members were unaware that we had reopened when they came back to the library for the first time. While our numbers have risen significantly from last summer, members being cautious or being unaware of our open status might be the cause for our numbers not quite reaching pre-pandemic levels.







How Members Registered






Staff Summer Reading Program

This year staff from all three branches were placed on 10 different teams. Using Beanstack staff would log whenever they used one of the following materials or services from the library: audiobook, cookbook, DVD or BluRay, fiction book, graphic novel, Hoopla. Kanopy, Libby, Library of Things, magazine, CD, nonfiction book, and videogame. In total library staff consumed 1,474 materials between June 1 and August 15 and in many cases became familiar with a service or type of material they were formerly unfamiliar with. In 2020 only 39 staff participated and read 181 items.



Visitors of the main library in Palatine need not fret if they spot ladders and construction tape in the lobby Saturday, when the community is invited to check out the progress of a 10-month renovation project.

The renovation of the first floor is nearly finished, and the magic is in full display just beyond the lobby.

There is an expansive new "marketplace" area for new and popular titles for books, movies and music; a new, modern teen space area; an updated children's area; and the crown jewel, a new, 4,600-square-foot makerspace called "the workshop" decked out with

impressive machinery such as a laser cutter, 3D printer, sewing and embroidery machines, a heat press, a 42-inch printer and more.

"We're so excited to see what our members do in this space," said Susan Conner, technology manager. "We expect to see crafters and artists making beautiful things, entrepreneurs creating prototypes and marketing materials, and anyone in between who wants to learn new skills or simply explore."

The library's second floor will have more study rooms, a larger quiet room and more, and will remain closed likely through the end of the month. The renovation is expected to be done by October, said Andrea Lublink, communications and marketing manager for the Palatine Public Library District.

The price tag is \$6.3 million for the main library, plus another \$500,000 for upgrades at the library branches in Hoffman Estates and Palatine. The project got the OK from voters in a 2019 referendum and includes a \$1.8 million grant from the Illinois State Library and Secretary of State's Office.

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"All of the new features in this renovation come from the feedback we received from the community during our last community survey and strategic planning process," Executive Director Jeannie Dilger said.

For example, teens wanted to have their own space, Lublink said. The new teen area, with a grey-and-lime color scheme, has study tables, comfortable seating for hanging out, and a gaming station. Another gaming station in the youth area serves children and tweens.

The children's area has new story rooms, bright colors and lighting, new furniture, and a nursing room. The children's books are all "face out" to be more inviting, Lublink said.

The vending machines -- offering coffee, soda, chips, candy and healthier options -- will move from the second to the first floor. The machines haven't arrived yet due to high demand after COVID-19 closures, Lublink said.

A new entrance was built on the north side of the building for more convenient access from the east and west parking lots. The paved paths to the new entrance have a "snow melt" system for wintry days, Lublink said.

The workshop area is designed to please patrons who enjoy crafting and those who like to work with heavy duty industrial equipment, Conner said. Patrons will be able to do things like cut glass, etch design, screen print T-shirts, print banners, learn to use Arduino

microcontroller boards, and much more.

Patrons will be charged nominal amounts for materials they use, such as 1 cent per gram of weight when they print items in 3D.

The workshop also has study rooms, and audio and video recording studios where you can do things like transfer VHS tapes to DVD.

The new Workshop at the Palatine Public Library's main branch will now allow patrons to show off their creativity with the ability of building their own projects.

The Palatine Public Library from 1 to 4 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 7 will celebrate the opening of the newly renovated first floor at its main branch, 700 N. North Ct. in Palatine.

Library visitors are invited to take a tour and see the new equipment at The Workshop. Guests can also enjoy a special storytime along with crafts for the family and find out the winner of the summer reading decorated T-shirt contest.

The Main Library Renovation Project, which began last November, provides enhancements to the main library and both its branches. Now, 10 months later, and thanks in part to a \$1.8 million grant from the Illinois State Library and Secretary of State's Office, certain spaces of the library are revitalized and nearly complete.

The Palatine Library is changing buildings to provide more convenient study and reading spaces, give members access to more information, and inspire them to learn new skills.

"All of the new features in this renovation come from the feedback we received from the community during our last community survey and strategic planning process," Executive Director Jeannie Dilger said. "Our residents' support during our 2019 referendum emphasized their support for maintaining a vibrant, flexible library to meet their needs."

The children's area has a fresh look with new story rooms, bright colors and lighting, new furniture, and a nursing room for mothers. The new area designated for teens includes study tables to hang out with brand new seating and gaming stations.

While most of the adult collection remains on the second floor, library members can browse the newer and more popular titles like music, movies, and books with ease in the open space on the first floor. A new north entrance was also built to provide more convenient access to the building from the east and west parking lots.

Library officials noted what really shines in this renovation is the new makerspace, or as the Palatine Library calls it, "The Workshop." This self-led space is equipped with a new laser cutter, 3D printer, sewing and embroidery machines, a heat press, and a large format printer among other things. With the plethora of new machinery, library members can learn new crafts, perfect their skills, and create their own projects.

"We're so excited to see what our members do in this space," Technology Manager Susan Conner said. "We expect to see crafters and artists making beautiful things, entrepreneurs creating prototypes and marketing materials, and anyone in between who wants to learn new skills or simply explore."

The 4,600 sq. ft. Workshop includes a lab, study rooms, and a recording studio. There are so many ways library members can express their creativity, explore, and experiment by building their own projects.

As more and more spaces in the building open, library members can explore new hobbies and reunite with the community.

The library serves approximately 90,000 residents predominantly within the communities of Palatine and Hoffman Estates.


