

Executive Director's Report December 2024

Employees enjoyed a resource fair in November. This fair not only highlighted benefits available to staff but also had community organizations that gave advice on healthy eating and personal financial management, and we got fun perks like 5minute chair massages and a free month of membership at the YMCA.

At our quarterly PIC training, we discussed two of the major incidents we had last month and had a good discussion on how to handle them moving forward. We were also able to serve our member with the suspension.

Management Team and the Communications Department received training on how to handle crisis communications. In addition to the training, the expert we hired is helping us beef up our crisis communication plan.

The Technology Department and Workshop Department are moving forward with the separation. We have hired four Workshop assistants who are getting excellent on-the-job training during the busy holiday gift-making season. We have begun interviewing for the Workshop Manager role.





Branches

We are moving forward with plans to create a Branches department. Lupe Colin, the manager for that department, will be reporting on the area branch study included in your packet. The Branches are getting their own Library of Things items and can now put holds on items in the LOT collection at Main. The recommendation from the policy committee in your packet to loan rules will allow Reciprocal Borrowers to place holds for pickup at our locations. This will give better customer service for all of our visitors and will be especially helpful at the two Branches since they are closer to our District boundaries.

Policy 9: Human Resources

Last month we talked about what we heard from staff to make this a better workplace. You will see some of these suggestions take shape in the changes to Policy 9. This policy is 41 pages long, and the policy committee and staff have spent a while reviewing and revising it. I would like to highlight some of the changes that we hope will have a big impact on staff and help us meet the strategic plan goal 1 of supporting staff. As always, you will see changes throughout that eliminate extraneous language and simplify language for clarity.

- 9-2.1 clarified that restroom breaks can be taken at any time, 15-minute breaks are paid, and eliminated a time limit for expressing breast milk.
- 9-2.8 increased the type and amount of gifts allowed to match the gift ban act.
- 9-3.7 added milestone anniversaries to the policy and increase amounts.
- 9-6.1 gave holiday pay to all part-time staff except subs.
- 9-6.4 gave all full-time staff 4 weeks of vacation regardless of exemption status and shortened the amount of time it takes for part-time staff to earn more vacation.
- 9-7.3 increased allowable bereavement leave and added language for a person of significance who might not be an official family member.
- 9-7.5 increase paid parental leave to 8 weeks.
- 9-9.6 increase volunteer time off so all staff may participate.
- 9-10.1 clarified a reasonable amount of time for responses to complaints.
- 9-10.5 changed the vaccination policy to allow for any type of vaccine. Total time off is still the same.

Please let me know if you have any questions or grammar changes before the meeting. We know that there are still some areas that will need changes. The tuition reimbursement policy is one area we are researching for next year.













Highlights from the 2023 Strategic Plan Research Report

- There is a strong desire for Spanish language programming from Rand Branch users.
- Members value Rand Staff and the ability to have children close while they look at the collection. There is a desire for more places to sit and read at Rand branch.
- Patrons of the Rand Road Branch are statistically most likely to find Events and Classes Extremely Important.
- RRB Members: Nearly 2/3 are from households include both Adults and Children significantly more than any other branch.
- Members are very interested in programs that teach skills for all age levels.
- Members also desire to have programs and services during non-working hours.

Short Term Suggestions for Rand Road Branch

Programming and Outreach

Having RRB oversee all programs will lessen the load on the Youth Services Department and the Adult Services Department. Hiring two full-time staff members will allow us to take over existing programming and expand our offerings.

- 1 FT Librarian (Collections, Programming and Outreach)
- 1 FT Associate (Programming and Outreach)

The rest of RRB staff will support programs and outreach. They are currently on desk during their entire shift, and with additional staff, we can:

- Support new and current programming initiatives
- Support other outreach requests coming from Main (school outreach, for example)
- Fulfill outreach requests coming from CRC organizations

Space Needs

To provide more programming, more access to programming spaces is needed. At this point, the library is struggling to secure space at the CRC for regular programming. The Rand Road Branch is an alternative space to provide smaller programs.

There is also a need for spaces for people to sit, lounge and work. There is currently only one small table that one or two members can use.

To meet the needs of the community, the library could:

- Shift collections to walls to have less bulky furniture in the middle of the room so staff can easily move things to host programs
- Provide more spaces for members to sit and stay in the library for a longer period
- Have enough tables and chairs to host small programs (about 22 members), CRC supplements some chairs and tables

Long Term Suggestions

The Palatine community is getting more diverse, not just with Spanish speakers, but there has been an influx of new immigrant communities (Ukranian, Russian, etc.). To continue fulfilling the needs of the diverse community, there are 3 areas that the library could focus on.

1. Spaces

Expanding the Rand Road Branch as well as the North Hoffman Branch to a bigger space with more access to a programming room would allow staff to expand programming, invite local schools to the branch and even rent out to the room to local organizations. It would also provide room for the need for a diverse collection of materials, including the demand for Library of Things and materials in other languages.

2. Staff

More staff is needed to fulfill the growing needs of the community. Members need continued access to technology and diverse materials. More staff would allow us to visit other community organizations, expand our programming selections to include more tech focused classes like Workshop offerings. There should be continued focus on tech training and hiring staff members that speak primarily Spanish, but also Russian, Ukranian, Japanese and other growing languages.

3. Outreach Team


In many nearby branches, even the bigger, standalone ones, outreach was localized to a team of people. This allows staff to focus on their respective library and offerings, and the library would have a dedicated team handling most outreach events.

- The outreach team would attend all tabling events, Spanish must be a language that at least some of the staff speak
- YTS would continue doing school outreach during the regular hours, but all family events would be attended by outreach staff.
- All other staff would be expected to participate in outreach but not to the extent we are asking now.
- Adult services would continue to offer adult specific outreach like nursing home visits and homebound delivery.

Staff Structure Recommendation

Although the branches are like smaller extensions of the Main Branch, they have more specialized needs compared to Main that need to be evaluated along with Outreach services since those initiatives are geared to connecting the community to the library, especially the underrepresented populations. A staff member overseeing branches and community services would oversee growth for both branches and manage outreach initiatives with the goal of connecting members to all branches and library services.

'A Regular Guy From Des Plaines'

The Bright Lights Don't Seem Too Far Off For Local Native Andre Bellos

As a child growing up, did you ever dream of one day becoming a Hollywoodactor? Since the tender age of 5, Andre Bellos has had thatcherishedaspiration and more than 30 years later he continues to fulfill that ambition.

Growing upinanon-Hollywood household in Des Plaines, Bellos fondly reminisces about his first performances with brother Peter. "We would put on magic shows for our parents and I would make my brother disappear," he said with a laugh. "He would always run the act because he never disappeared at the right time. I knew then that I wanted to entertain people."

While attending Maine West High School, Bellos cut his thespian teeth and was very active in the arts as a member of the choir, drama class, and dance and talent shows. Oneof his former teachers and dance instructor Lisa Jacob recognized something special in Bellos. "He was a good dancer, and singer and came prepared for all of the performances he participated in," she said.

Bellos has ramped up his pursuit and since 2010 has worked as an extra climbing the ladder one rung at a time appearing in such movies as, "Captive State", "The Dilemma", and the Spike Lee directed "Chi-Raq". In 2015, he signed with several talent agencies including Dream Team in Chicago, Atlanta, New York and Los Angeles, andBabes 'n'Beaus 'modeline agency in Husdale

modeling agency in Hinsdale. Bellos' dedication and determination continue to pay off. Last season, he had a speaking role as Lucas on "Chicago Med". In July, on the show, the "Greatest Prison Escapes" that aired on the History Channel, he portrayed a real-life person in Javier Zapata, an inmate who escaped from the Sante Fe, NM, state prison in 2008. He shared that the on-set experiences were special. "It was a great learning experience surrounded by talented actors and production people. I was in my element." Some of his early successes allowed Bellos to earn his Screen Actors Guild card. "I'm proud of the roles that I've played and being a card-carrying actor.'

Rejection is a big part of the business and Bellos learned to take it in stride. "When you are young and starting out going to auditions, you can take it personally when not chosen," he explained. "Now that I have some experience, I understand that directors are looking
